Eric Liddell is a saint, and a man with such a heart for God, who was a true and loving witness clear to the end.

The Gift of Years: Growing Older Gracefully by Joan Chittister

A perfect book, and one I very much wanted someone to write. I was over the top thrilled when found I it the first few months after I retired, a time when I was looking for good books to challenge and feed my soul and give me new visions for my life. **Every retired person should read this!**

Power of Praise by Merlin Carothers

She Believes by Debbie Lindell

A Song for Nagasaki by Father Paul Glynn

A Shelton household read-aloud of a Japanese doctor who became a Catholic believer, worked in the days of early radiation, and survived the atomic bomb dropped on Nagasaki. His life's story is an unbelievable gift and challenge to the rest of us, and his love amidst a time of great horror is incredible.

Tending Roses by Lisa Wingate

A simple story of a grandmother who is starting to lose her memory, a granddaughter and husband who come to be with her, and the waves of influence the grandma has over her family and many in the community. A great read for grandparents as it shows how important our influence and wisdom are to those who come after us.

A powerful book that I read before going to Rwanda, which challenged me greatly to go forth and try and do much more for the poor and hurting in our world for Jesus. It is also Stearns' story of his conversion and his further faith growth.
