


Books we Love that You May Like to Read This Summer:











- **7)** Just Mercy—So Powerful—Great detail on real problems/solutions in our southern prison systems. The author is still working on justice for all today! This is a movie, too.









- **17)** The Boys in the Boat—Fabulous history abounds in this true story of a group of mostly very poor young men who raced on a crew team from University of Washington and went to the Olympics. Pastor Plaehn highly recommended this book long ago. Read this aloud to our 93 & 94 yr. old parents.
- 18) **Wonder** by Patricia Palacio, impacts one immeasurably right from the start, and shows clearly the life of a handicapped child with an amazing spirit and personality. Also a movie, but the movie leaves out much of the story. I gave it as Christmas gifts to all my family members the year it came out. Make sure your copy includes the Eugene story, too. - 28) **Radical Compassion** & **They Come Back Singing**—Life changing books by Father Gary Smith, a Jesuit priest who's worked in Tacoma, Portland, and Uganda, and has such a marvelous heart and eyes like Jesus for the people he loves and serves. Father Smith is one of my heroes!
- 29) **Tatoos on the Heart** by Father Gregory Boyle, a Jesuit priest who has helped many gang members change the course of their lives, start bakeries, clothing lines, and much more. Amazing works being done with God's help.
- **30)** The Highest Tide--Jim Lynch--Excellent coming of age novel set in the salt water beauty of Puget Sound by a local Olympia, WA author. **Peace Like a River**--Leif Enger--This one was a gift to my son by a high school English teacher in 2000 for summer reading! Super novel about a 1960's western countryside heroic quest, with themes of tragedy, love, faith and family all interwoven. **Murphy's Law**--Rhys Bowen---The first of many in the Molly Murphy Mystery series. I just received #3 and can't wait to read it. They are funny, gripping, fast moving and very well written. The setting is turn of the century (early 1900's) New York City.
