Introduction

The 2024 Ministry Plan is the missional story of our congregation. Just as individuals have stories of God's abundant care for them, our narrative Ministry Plan tells the story of how Peace's ministries make a measurable impact on changing lives and blessing the community.

In 2010 Peace Lutheran Church underwent a vigorous process of prayer, Bible study, congregation retreat, and task force discussions to discern God's vision for our ministry. God revealed an exciting vision, supported by a compelling statement of mission and strong foundation of core values. In December 2010, the people of Peace adopted the mission, vision and core values at the annual congregation meeting as an expression of who we are and what God has called us to do. In December 2011, the people of Peace adopted our first ever annual Ministry Plan.

Built around Peace's five-part vision statement, the Ministry Plan brings the typical line-item budget to life and celebrates what God is accomplishing through us. With the Future Directions discerned during the pandemic, we have more clarity of purpose as we live into God's vision, grounded in a Foundational Commitment to Anti-Racism. The Ministry Plan gives us focus and energy as we accomplish God's work in our community. It shows our investments of ministries and finances in ministry. We include our partnership in mission with Peace Community Center and updates on mission accomplishments.

God has been at work in powerful ways through Peace Lutheran Church in 2023. The **2024 Ministry Plan** continues to help Peace look forward in mission and move toward God's vision. We explore God's Vision for Peace through the five vision points. Ministry emphases in 2023 reflected in the 2024 Ministry Plan include living into our future directions, our strong ministry of place in housing and community resources ministry, and children's/youth/family/intergenerational ministry. 2024 will be an exciting year as two Future Directions Work Groups help us live out our action plans for God's ministry in the future and Deacon Charissa Carroll takes on a full-time role as Deacon of Congregational Care and Community Resources.

A Narrative Presentation to the 2024 Budget

In the pages that follow, you will learn about many of the ministries and teams at Peace, and how they work together to serve. This narrative will help you see the personal impact of your giving and your service. Here at Peace, giving is more than paying bills and funding an institution, and serving is more than filling volunteer positions that every church expects. Instead, our giving and our service are doing the work of Christ, serving and growing God's kingdom here in the Hilltop, broader community, and the world. In other words, we don't give our time and money TO the church, but rather we give THROUGH the church to reach real people in real ways that make real differences in their lives, now and for eternity.

After reviewing the Ministry Plan, we hope that you will recognize that everything we have—and all that we are—is a gift from God, a gift that we are given to use in ways that contribute to God's own purposes. Further, we hope you recognize that how we spend and share our money and time says a lot about our core values and priorities. Your ongoing support, generosity, and service are greatly needed and appreciated, and will help us move forward, together, with our ministries here at Peace.

The Ministry Plan is funded and carried out through regular giving and service by the people of Peace, contributions from guests and visitors, church and community grants, and funds from Thrivent Financial and other company gifts. The Church Council recognizes and thanks all of you for your giving and service in support of our vision, mission, and ministries!

Mission

Compelled by the love of God and our faith in Jesus Christ, Peace Lutheran Church, a diverse people of faith, in partnership with Peace Community Center, seeks to realize God's dream for the world through worship, learning, giving, and serving.



Values

We seek to realize God's dream for the world by living out these values:

- 1. (Serve with) **Courage**: We respond to God's call with boldness, creativity, and honesty, and engage the realities of life with perseverance and joy. (Joshua 1:9)
 - "Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."
- 2. (Embrace) **Diversity**: We invite and welcome, honor and respect people of all ages, cultures, and walks of life, and encourage people to use their unique God-given gifts and abilities. (Romans 12:4-6)
 - "For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us."
- 3. (Cultivate) **Community**: We listen, build relationships, grow in faith, and experience God's grace, as we work together in our urban Hilltop neighborhood and larger community. (Colossians 3:12-17)
 - "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."
- 4. (Seek) **Justice**: We advocate for the dignity of all people by addressing basic needs, empowering through education, and working toward a socially just world. (Micah 6:8-9)
 - "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? The voice of the Lord cries to the city—it is sound wisdom to fear your name: Hear, O tribe and assembly of the city!"

Vision

We believe God's vision for Peace is to be a diverse community of faith in the Hilltop where all are welcome – a community that is *Spirit-Filled, Compassionate, Healthy, Reconciled,* and *Just.*

Welcome Statement

All are welcome at Peace! We are a diverse community of welcome for people of all ethnic and cultural heritages, ages and generations, educational and financial backgrounds, gender identities and sexual orientations, spiritual and religious preferences, gifts and abilities! Centered in Jesus and his love, we believe that every human being is created in the image of God, whose Spirit gathers us into one community of faith in our Hilltop neighborhood. You are a blessing to Peace! We welcome your presence, your gifts, your voice, your service, your leadership, and our shared life together in community!

The 2024 Ministry Plan is organized around the five elements of our vision.

If vision defines the future we are working toward, our Ministry Plan should reveal the resources of time, talent, and possessions necessary to get there... and it may reveal whether or not we are placing the appropriate level of resources in each area.

Visioning and Future Directions

A Verse for Discerning God's Vision — Proverbs 29:18: "Where there is no vision, the people perish."



Vision gives hope and purpose for people and community, what we need to truly live! We are reminded of the vision statement of Peace Lutheran Church every Sunday in worship.

God is calling us to be a diverse community of faith in the Hilltop where all are welcome – a community that is Spirit-Filled, Compassionate, Healthy, Reconciled, and Just. A Future Directions Team met for 18 months during the pandemic to discern what that means for Peace Lutheran Church as we walk into the future. Our context is changing with the gentrification of the Hilltop

neighborhood with accompanying displacement of long-term residents (especially families of color), and there is a deep need for racial justice in our diverse community and nation. God is good and God is faithful, and God continues to give us energy to move into the future with hope

and a strong sense of calling. The congregation has embraced a Foundational Commitment to Anti-Racism and four Future Directions that guide us as we live into God's vision in the coming years as a multiethnic, multigenerational church. Brendan Nelson's church staff position as Director of Community Engagement and Outreach was set up to help us move forward toward these Future Directions.

Where have we come so far this year, and where are we going in our Future Directions?

In 2023, a Future Directions Action Plan Team under the facilitation of Bill Hanawalt, working closely with Brendan Nelson and Pastor John, met to create an action plan for our Future Directions with action items including timelines, outcomes, leadership and accountability, and resources needed, all undergirded by our Foundational Commitment to Anti-Racism. Two work groups emerged out of this process to help our congregation put these plans into action – an **Anti-Racism Work Group** facilitated by Julia Kagochi with Pastor John as church staff support, and a **Ministry of Place/Activation Work Group** facilitated by Bill Hanawalt and Joey Ager with Brendan Nelson as church staff support. You are invited to discern how you will be part of living out these Future Directions. As we always say at Peace, "Get in where you fit in!"

Overarching Future Direction: Anti-Racism

Our Foundational Commitment to Anti-Racism: As followers of Jesus, we believe Jesus calls us to understand, address, and dismantle racism in individuals, communities, systems, and structures, joining God in bringing about justice for the oppressed and transformation of all society.



Future Direction: Catechism of Peace

The Catechism of Peace is how we teach our Christian faith in the context of our community and embed theology that is crucial to our congregation living out our faith, like loving our neighbor, justice, anti-racism, reconciliation, and other areas.

Taking action through the Anti-Racism Work Group:

The Anti-Racism Work Group's goal is to strengthen the congregation's commitment to anti-racism while moving the work forward. We began meeting in September 2023 to determine the values and decision-making practices of the group, as well as assess our immediate next steps based on the Future Directions Action Plan. The first course of action was to review and share with the congregation the survey responses from Spring 2023. In the new year, the work group will be focusing on increasing educational opportunities for church members, creating the resource library book list, and developing an equity toolkit that church leaders can utilize during decision and policy making. – Julia Kagochi

Actions this Year Toward These Future Directions:



- Conversations Around Race Workshop Series on Racial Justice: Several leaders from Peace are part of an ecumenical group of leaders called the Conversation Around Race planning team with some other local congregations, and we hosted a workshop series to listen to stories of historic injustice (Native American genocide/colonialism, the WW2 Japanese American internment, and the historical experience of the Black community in Tacoma), and invite the stories of how some local Tacoma congregations, including Peace, are confronting racism in their congregations and communities.
- **Confronting Racism Synod Cohort Gatherings**: A cohort of representatives from 7 different Lutheran congregations in our synod gathered monthly for a six-month journey together called "Confronting Racism." A team of six from Peace participated and met for deeper conversation around confronting racism and actions for justice that would make a difference.
- "Were You There? Lenten Reflections on the Spirituals": Lynn Longfield led a Sunday Lenten series on Spirituals found in Black Church traditions, with music and reflection provided by Gospel musicians in our community, including Twylla Moore, Dorothy White, Damishe Greenwood-Walker, and Rev. Annie Jones-Barnes. The series helped us face the reality of our lives, center on our relationship to God in Jesus, and find hope in God's future of justice and love. We listened to the Spirituals' witness to trust in God's power of deliverance, reminding us, despite what any of us may face, with faith we too shall overcome.
- **Anti-Racism Congregational Survey:** The Future Directions Action Plan Team surveyed our church in the spring to get feedback from the whole congregation to help the Anti-Racism Work Group help us all live out our commitment to anti-racism as inclusively as possible in life and ministry at Peace.

The Priesthood of All Believers is how we support the discipleship and leadership development of all participants in our Peace community of faith.


Taking action through the Ministry of Place/Activation Work Group:

The Ministry of Place/Activation Work Group is responsible for stewarding Peace's embodied presence in the Hilltop of Tacoma, in particular through the work of the affordable Housing ministry, Peace Community Center, the Community Meal & Resources ministry, and other projects. We believe Peace is at its best when we live into our identity as a neighborhood church: we are called to incarnational presence here in the Hilltop where we work to be good neighbors. We recognize that our neighbors are often impacted by housing insecurity, economic instability, displacement and gentrification, violence and other challenges. We acknowledge that to be good neighbors in a diverse, multicultural neighborhood we must confess the structural sin of racism - and the church's historic complicity in that system - and live into our foundational commitment to anti-racism. Our work team is responsible for nurturing the community ministries rooted in at Peace, stewarding their growth and sustainability, and connecting them to Peace's future direction.

Actions this Year Toward These Future Directions:

- **Housing Ministry**: With the addition of the 2-bedroom DADU, we have expanded the Housing ministry to provide affordable housing for another family displaced from our gentrifying Hilltop neighborhood. The Ministry of Place team is helping our congregation vision for the future in housing ministry.
- Enterprise Partners: Peace Lutheran Church was part of a faith-based development initiative around housing through a group called Enterprise Partners. The group met over 6 months and was equipped with the knowledge and tools to guide us in ways to develop our underutilized land into affordable homes and community space. Soon an Enterprise Partners grant will help us do a future feasibility study.



- **St. Mark's Partnership**: This year our partnership with St. Marks by the Narrows church led to a joint grant application for solar panels for another one of the houses we steward in our Housing ministry. St. Mark's and we together received a total of \$50,000 in grant funds from Tacoma Public Utilities to share for solar panels! We will add solar panels to the 1-bedroom house we steward early next year.
- Community Resources Ministry and Resource Navigator: We continue to offer a free community meal every Friday evening throughout the year, partnering with congregations and community groups to provide and serve meals. Through Resource Navigator, Deacon Charissa Carroll, we support individuals in need toward a more sustainable livelihood. The goal is to walk alongside and equip individuals struggling with economic poverty to take positive steps toward greater economic sustainability.



- Stewardship Series: The Stewardship Team planned our fall series themed, "All Hands on Deck." We took time during the Sunday faith education hour and in worship to explore scripture, share faith reflections, and hear personal stories from people at Peace about God working in us and through us as we jump in and serve, knowing we need everybody's gifts and service.
- **Ministry Fair**: The fall Ministry Fair showcased church ministries and gave opportunities for people to sign up to serve. All hands on deck!

Housing and Community Resources Ministries

A Verse for Community Development — Jeremiah 29:7: "But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare."

Peace Lutheran Church has been taking intentional steps toward strengthening our ministry of place in community development. In **Housing ministry**, we have expanded the number of houses we steward from three to four by building a two-bedroom small home (DADU) in the backyard of the house at 1953 S. Cushman. Now we are able to offer affordable housing to four families with connections to the Hilltop who have been affected by the displacement that has come with gentrification. This is a justice ministry. A Housing team oversees our housing program, renovation and maintenance of the houses, and family support for tenants. The Ministry of Place/Activation Work Group is helping us vision for future ministry in housing. In **Community Resources ministry**, we offer a year-round Friday Community Meal program with community resources, and our Resource Navigator, Deacon Charissa Carroll, comes alongside individuals who seek longer term sustainability for their families. This is a step beyond charity toward individual and community development, grounded in justice.















Children's, Youth and Family / Intergenerational Ministry

A Verse for Children's, Youth and Family Ministry – 1 Thessalonians 2:8: Paul writes, "So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us."

Jayna Detweiler, Coordinator of Children's, Youth and Intergenerational Ministry, continues to help Peace establish a solid foundation for children's, youth and intergenerational ministry. The Church Council approves and strongly supports the vision and plan for moving forward in this ministry at Peace.



Children's Ministry Vision: Children and families of all backgrounds and walks of life feel welcome, safe, and loved; encounter and experience the wonder and love of God in Jesus through regular worship, dynamic Bible stories, engaging prayer, and caring relationships; learn and grow in faith surrounded by grace-filled community; discover their God-given gifts; and use their gifts to serve God, the church, the neighborhood, and the world. We celebrate and lift up children, create opportunities for children to give and serve, and encourage the community to open our arms and to receive the gifts children offer.

Youth and Family Ministry Vision: Sharing faith and life is the hope and goal of youth, family, and outreach ministries of Peace. Each student and family has their own story. We desire to make space for them to share their stories and to hear (again) the story of God's love for us and for this world. We connect

youth with caring adults in trusting, faith-filled relationships. We offer youth opportunities to grow in faith, discover gifts, serve meaningfully, and develop as leaders.

The Purpose of Youth Ministry at Peace Lutheran Church: to create, nourish and strengthen relationships between:

 youth and God, youth and the family, youth and peers, youth and Peace Community Center, and youth and the congregation

so that through these relationships,

 they may hear the Gospel of Jesus Christ, which will <u>create</u>, nourish and <u>strengthen</u> their faith.

2024 Ministry Goals:

- **INVEST** in the lives of young people in significant ways
- **INSPIRE** them by our example and challenge them to strengthen and deepen their faith

Jayna Detweiler has worked to build connections with each youth and fellowship between the youth. We have continued to pour into faith education opportunities that permit our young people time with one another to continue and explore their faith and identity journeys. We look forward to more opportunities to dive deeper into their interests and ways to continue to live out their faith by serving the community. The highlight of this past year was spending a week last summer getting to serve and learn with the Yakama Nation and Mending Wings ministry. We hope to continue our relationship with those on the reservation and look for more ways to grow and learn in youth ministry.

Our classes for children and youth continue to explore the Bible while connecting with how we interact with the world each day. We focus on compassion, love and joy for God, ourselves, and each other.

Here are the classes we have been doing with our youth.

- **Explorers** is a class that bridges the gap between children's ministry and the youth group and helps youth expand their understanding of the Bible through engaging, powerful lessons scripted just for them.
- **Feet to Faith Confirmation** is a two-year program of study and service with fun and challenging ways to help students grow in faith in God.















Increased Staffing for Ministry in 2024

The proposed 2024 budget from the Church Council allows the congregation to expand Deacon Charissa Carroll's part-time Resource Navigator position to full-time Deacon of Congregational Care & Community Resources. She will lead the congregation and serve in worship, pastoral care, teaching/faith formation, and community engagement/outreach and resource navigation, areas of ministry need at Peace. In April 2023 Deacon Charissa was ordained into Word and Service rostered ministry in the ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) at Peace Lutheran Church.

Partnership with Peace Community Center

A Word from the Peace Community Center Board of Directors:

Dear Peace Lutheran Church,

We are grateful for your continued care and support for Hilltop youth!



In this time of transition, the Peace Community Center remains committed to the children, youth, and families of our Hilltop neighborhood. We, the Board of Directors of Peace Community Center want to share an update with you and our community. In an effort to stabilize our financial foundation and discern paths forward for the Center's future and sustainability, we have paused academic programming for this school year. While we pause programming, here are our current four areas of focus:

- Reset: We are currently addressing immediate finance and administrative needs to stabilize the
 organization.
- **Build Trust**: We acknowledge that this has been a challenging transition, and some confidence has been lost in our community, and with the young people and families we are committed to serving. Soon we will communicate with community members and partners to listen to feedback and share next steps so that we are able to move forward together.
- **Renew**: We intend to undergo a community needs assessment and strategic planning so we may more effectively serve our mission in our Hilltop neighborhood.
- **Rebuild**: We will tackle Board and organizational development so we can build back stronger and fulfill our commitments to our community.

In the meantime, please know that Peace Community Center continues to actively partner with Peace Lutheran Church to serve the Hilltop in many ways:

- Supports regular free community meals on site with community resource navigation, a clothing closet, and hygiene supplies,
- Serves as an affordable space for community gatherings (e.g., around housing, youth concerns, and police/community safety), events hosted by local social service organizations, and community groups,
- Provides care and support for youth and families of the Hillton neighborhood.

We are grateful for your partnership and welcome your ongoing support as we reassess, revision, and rebuild.

God's vision for Peace is to be a community that is **Spirit-filled**. God's Spirit blows in us and through us, giving us energy and power and direction and renewal for ministry and mission. God's Spirit fills us in worship, learning, giving, and serving. "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do **justice**, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" -- Micah 6:8

God's vision for Peace is to be a community that is **just**—that is marked by the quality of God's justice. God's justice is about dignity and fairness for all in this world, an equal distribution of resources so all have their basic needs met. Seeking God's justice means fixing what is broken in institutions and societies, systems and groups that oppress others either intentionally or unintentionally. It means working so that all people might be able to reach their God-given potential and so that all families might be self-reliant. It does not foster dependent relationships but seeks interdependent community. It recognizes that all people have value and assets and gifts to share with others. It is about Christian community development in the Hilltop, seeking that our neighbors have affordable housing, living-wage jobs, decent health care, and good education. It is more than charity, which treats symptoms of problems with a handout. Justice gives a hand up and more, addressing root causes of injustice and advocating on behalf of the vulnerable for systemic change; for example, advocacy with decision makers toward eliminating the opportunity gap in education for low-income and underrepresented students, increasing access to affordable housing for low-income residents, dismantling racially unjust policies and practices in hiring, housing, and healthcare.



rather so we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith both yours and mine." Did you catch that? The great apostle Paul needs to be encouraged in his faith as much as you and I. Community Bible Study


