Support organizations and individuals directly impacted by the administration's nationwide gutting of the [AmeriCorps Program](#). As partners of the Peace Community Center, we have witnessed firsthand the gift of AmeriCorps service and thus we can understand how devastating it is to lose these incredible hard working members overnight.

One local organization, [Imagine Justice Project](#) (IJP), housed 18 AmeriCorps members, who worked at 11 Tacoma-based non-profit organizations. Not only were they immediately terminated, but by law, AmeriCorps members are not allowed to seek unemployment benefits. IJP has set up a [GoFundMe](#) for the 18 members to provide immediate relief during this time. Please consider donating

Celebrate wins! [HB 1232](#) has passed and is officially law in WA state! This bill sought to increase oversight and accountability at private detention facilities, like the NW Detention Center in our backyard. According to the La Resistencia NW, this bill will allow the Department of Health to conduct unannounced inspections inside the centers and enforce compliance with state and federal laws.
